A year of bedding in for the Fifth, new section leaders and teams are beginning to work well and noticeably starting to complete their Wood Badges. Liz Martin in particular has also taken the lead on fundraising and organised a terrific Burns Night event for us and now looks to take on a District role of Training Adviser for The Fifth on top of her ACSL full role.

Bag packing at Waitrose proved a good success with future plans to secure a busier weekend for next Christmas.

A new assistant treasurer has been press ganged along with parent executive committee members to broaden our vision of the Scouting we provide for our members and our new Chairman gained his PCV license enabling the Scouts to visit the war graves.

Our Explorers supported the local community in providing a water station for the Beckenham Half Marathon and the Group as a whole manned a checkpoint for the St Christopher's fun walk in Keston.

Our Beavers had some basic starter kayaking sessions at Pinewood Scout centre and our Cubs and Scouts had open water days with the Sea Scouts at docklands.

All sections camped successfully with the Cubs enjoying bouncy castles and obstacle course along with some glorious weather at Whitsun, whilst the Beavers had a fabulous summer camp at Wilberforce. Over the summer break, Scouts returned to Deal for a green field camp and Explorers went away on their own to Snowdonia utilising a light weight camp setup which quite frankly almost blew away.

As a Group and leadership team, our training records look healthier than ever with a few more boxes to tick over the coming year and our newly bolstered executive committee is leading The Fifth in its continued success, in particular the unsung heroes such as our treasurer and secretary keep on top of the running of the Group whilst Section leaders and assistants keep raising the bar on adventure and Scouting for our young members.

Merry Beavers - Wednesday

The new year is due to bring lots of exciting meetings, camps and day trips our way and myself and the team could not be more excited to spend another year teaching and caring for our colony of amazing Beaver Scouts.

Pippin Beavers - Thursday

Dave and Spencer were assisted by two new leaders, Anna and Helen, as well as Lizzie (who became an adult leader) along with two new young leaders Dylan and Kirsty. The colony maintained its numbers throughout this period at 24.

A busy itinerary saw the beaver scouts not only attend each week but they also took part in a variety of other activities.

The first event was getting close to various reptiles including snakes and lizards – along with Merry colony, 12 of our Beavers attended.

For the first time in several years, the group attended the St George's Day Parade, held along the Petts Wood High Street on 22nd April.

In early June, we combined again with Merry colony for our summer camp. This was held at Wilberforce Scout Centre in Keston and the beaver scouts enjoyed sleeping in tents, making fires, cooking smores over the fires and of course the campfire. A total of 16 beaver scouts from Pippin colony attended this two-night event.

Later in June, 20 beaver scouts attend Frylands Scout Centre's Wild West Funday – activities included archery, air rifles, obstacle course, bouncy castles and a hike through the woods.

After the summer break 8 beavers from Pippin, along with a number from Merry colony, attended a kayaking afternoon at Pinewood Scout Centre where they earned their time on the water stage 1 badge.

In October, 6 beavers achieved their swimming badge stage 1 award by taking part in the District run event held at the Beckenham Spa.

The Remembrance Day parade took place on Sunday 11th November with the rest of the group – a fantastic turnout from both colonies and the behaviour from the beavers was impeccable.

13 attended the Winter Camp in December which was held at Downe camp site. This was a combined camp not only with Merry colony but also our Cub packs. The beavers enjoyed a variety of activities including grass sledging, crate stacking, abseiling, arts & crafts plus, of course, a visit from Santa.

The most memorable part of the weekend was meeting Father Christmas in his house and our hike back to our hut with our laser lights. Can't wait until we go again this year with the Beavers.

Remembrance Sunday saw a good turnout of cubs to the annual parade and service at the war memorial. We had a good turn out of the St Amory water day where cubs achieved their water sports activity badge.

The highlight of the year is always our Whitsun camp near Dorking. This year saw sunshine and showers for the weekend but that didn't dampen the fun. We had a great weekend doing backwoods cooking, go karts, archery and of course the traditional barbeque and camp fire. We also had a bouncy slide and assault course on Sunday as well.

The cubs have worked hard on their badges this year and all the cubs moving up to scouts are gaining their chief scout silver award with many of the younger cubs well on their way to achieving the award.

Scouts

Both troops continue to flourish. Thunder, on Thursdays, is led by Tim Younge and Lightning, on Fridays, is led by Don Mullane. We are grateful to all our leaders for their hard work: Spencer, Nick, Oliver, CJ, Helen, Alison, Marc, John Spence, Simon, Nicole, Connie and Daphne, and an array of other helpers who are all vital to both Troops.
